ENVIRONMENTAL CHECKLIST

Purpose of checklist:

The State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA), chapter 43.21C RCW, requires all governmental agencies to consider the environmental impacts of a proposal before making decisions. An environmental impact statement (EIS) must be prepared for all proposals with probable significant adverse impacts on the quality of the environment. The purpose of this checklist is to provide information to help you and the agency identify impacts from your proposal (and to reduce or avoid impacts from the proposal, if it can be done) and to help the agency decide whether an EIS is required.

Instructions for applicants:

This environmental checklist asks you to describe some basic information about your proposal. Governmental agencies use this checklist to determine whether the environmental impacts of your proposal are significant, requiring preparation of an EIS. Answer the questions briefly, with the most precise information known, or give the best description you can.

You must answer each question accurately and carefully, to the best of your knowledge. In most cases, you should be able to answer the questions from your own observations or project plans without the need to hire experts. If you really do not know the answer, or if a question does not apply to your proposal, write "do not know" or "does not apply." Complete answers to the questions now may avoid unnecessary delays later.

Some questions ask about governmental regulations, such as zoning, shoreline, and landmark designations. Answer these questions if you can. If you have problems, the governmental agencies can assist you.

The checklist questions apply to all parts of your proposal, even if you plan to do them over a period of time or on different parcels of land. Attach any additional information that will help describe your proposal or its environmental effects. The agency to which you submit this checklist may ask you to explain your answers or provide additional information reasonably related to determining if there may be significant adverse impact.

The proposed non-project action does not involve creating or eliminating parking spaces.

This is a non-project proposal and new roads and streets or improvements would not be required.

Information on location of water, rail, or air transportation does not apply to this proposal since it is a non-project action. The City of Sumner has SR410 and SR167; and Burlington Northern Santa Fe and Union Pacific Railroads within the City limits.

The proposed non-project action does not involve vehicular trips.

Non-project Action. Automotive sales and rental agencies already exist in the MUD zone and other zones in town. These existing facilities are currently served by East Pierce Fire and Rescue, Sumner PD, and have a variety of professional services available in town.

D. SUPPLEMENTAL SHEET FOR NONPROJECT ACTIONS

The proposed non-project action is not likely to increase the discharge to water; emissions to air; or production, storage or release of toxic or hazardous substance; or production of noise. The amendments to the LDR-4 zone would allow for similar uses as currently allowed in other zones in the city.

Proposed measures to avoid or reduce such increases are:

The proposed non-project action does not involve impacts on water, air, noise, or production, storage, or release of toxic or hazardous substances. Therefore, no mitigation measures are proposed.

2. How would the proposal be likely to affect plants, animals, fish, or marine life?

The proposed non-project action does not involve impacts to the natural environment, including plants, animals, fish, and marine life.

Proposed measures to protect or conserve plants, animals, fish, or marine life are:

The proposed non-project action does not involve impacts to the natural environment. Therefore, no mitigation measures are proposed.

3. How would the proposal be likely to deplete energy or natural resources?

The proposed non-project action does not involve any depletion of energy or natural resources.

Proposed measures to protect or conserve energy and natural resources are:

The proposed non-project action does not involve impacts to energy or natural resources. Therefore, no mitigation measures are proposed.

4. How would the proposal be likely to use or affect environmentally sensitive areas or areas designated (or eligible or under study) for governmental protection; such as parks, wilderness, wild and scenic rivers, threatened or endangered species habitat, historic or cultural sites, wetlands, floodplains, or prime farmlands?

The proposed non-project action does not involve impacts to critical areas, natural resource lands (such as agricultural lands) and areas designated for governmental protection.

Proposed measures to protect such resources or to avoid or reduce impacts are:

The proposed amendments will allow existing automotive sales and rental agencies to expand within the zone they currently operate. In addition they will be allowed to expand onto adjacent MDR/HDR zones.

5. How would the proposal be likely to affect land and shoreline use, including whether it would allow or encourage land or shoreline uses incompatible with existing plans?

As the text amendment is written it would only allow a side yard setback of 5 feet in the LDR-4 zone where the size of the lot exceeds 6,000 square feet or where the design of the residence will provide approved accessibility. Any use of this exception may not exceed one story or 16 feet in height. As each development in this zone will undergo review and all development in the shoreline jurisdiction will need to obtain a shoreline development or substantial development permit, this text amendment is unlikely to have an affect on the shoreline.

Proposed measures to avoid or reduce shoreline and land use impacts are:

None. Non-project Action.

6. How would the proposal be likely to increase demands on transportation or public services and utilities?

The zoning code amendments would likely increase demand on transportation, public services, and utilities as development occurs at potentially higher intensities.

Proposed measures to reduce or respond to such demand(s) are:

Impacts on transportation, public services or utilities will be mitigated through impact fees, user fees, and taxes.

7. Identify, if possible, whether the proposal may conflict with local, state, or federal laws or requirements for the protection of the environment.

This proposal does not conflict with any local, state, or federal laws relating to the protection of the environment.
